
# Spring into Membership + the Hello Neighbors,

# Digging in the Dirt!

Here are a few of the many benefits found from digging in the dirt:

Increased exercise: A busy day in the garden can be a good form of exercise. While tending a garden, you perform functional movement that mimics whole body exercise. You perform squats and lunges while weeding. Carrying bags of mulch and other supplies works large muscle groups. Digging, raking and using a push mower can be physically intense activities. You may burn as many calories as a workout in the gym. If you aren't used to these types of activities, it is likely that you will feel a bit sore after a busy day gardening. Gardening also can improve your balance, strength and flexibility.

#### Time in nature:

Getting outdoors is good for your physical and mental health. People tend to breathe deeper when outside. This helps to clear out the lungs, improves digestion, improves immune response and increases oxygen levels in the



blood. Spending time outdoors has been shown to reduce heart rate and muscle tension. Sunlight lowers blood pressure and increases vitamin D levels.

Reduced stress levels: Nearly all forms of exercise can reduce stress including gardening. It's been shown to lighten mood and lower levels of stress and anxiety. Routines provide structure to our day and are linked to improved mental health. Gardening routines, like watering and weeding, can create a soothing rhythm to ease stress.

Social connection: Gardening brings people together and strengthens social connections. The gardening community is rich with people willing to share their expertise, time and occasionally plants with new gardeners. Master gardeners are local volunteers dedicated to educating and empowering fellow gardeners. Community garden plots bring together people with diverse backgrounds to work on a common goal. Many gardening friendships begin over celebrating a success or bemoaning a gardening misstep. Social connections are important because they help lower stress, improve resilience and provide support during difficult times in life. A strong sense of belonging lowers your risk of depression, anxiety and suicide.

# **CRIME WATCH**

**Some Good Reminders:** Crime can make its way to any neighborhood, no matter how "safe" it is. People can take plenty of preventative measures to protect their homes and neighborhoods. Neighborhood safety requires a team effort. The following tips for working together are simple but effective, making your neighborhood a more enjoyable place to live.

- ✓ Consider removing your home from Google Maps: [Thieves case houses on Google Maps to see how easy it is to access the property. To get your home removed, find your address on Google Maps; click on the smaller picture of your home to enlarge it; choose the "Report a Problem" link (bottom right of the picture alongside terms, copyright year, etc.); blur your home, any faces, car license plates, etc.; adjust the view of the image so it's on the portion you want to blur.]
- ✓ Use smart lights and other devices to create the impression you are home
- ✓ Know the people in your neighborhood so you can recognize suspicious people
- ✓ Keep your vacation dates off social media
- ✓ Make use of timers
- ✓ Lock all doors and windows / Utilize blinds and curtains
- ✓ Install motion sensor lights outside of your home:
- ✓ Keep your neighbors informed
- ✓ Be conservative with pricey possessions (deconstruct boxes purchases came in)
- ✓ Get a guard dog

### No Trespassing v. No Soliciting

From the Plano Police Department:

We have been asked to remind everyone there is no longer a need for a solicitor to obtain a permit for any solicitation-related activity. Homeowners should replace their no solicitation signs with ones that read "No Trespassing" or "No Trespass" in the description under 11-142 (b).

The new ordinance addresses activity on residential property with handbill distribution offenses and a newly created Class C criminal trespass. These offenses are content-neutral and based on actions rather than speech. As such, the offenses apply to anyone engaged in the prohibited activity regardless of the purpose of the activity. This includes commercial, religious, political, and charitable activities. A handbill is any printed or written matter, any sample or device, dodger, circular, leaflet, pamphlet, paper, booklet, or any other printed or otherwise reproduced original or copies of any matter or literature.



- Sec. 11-142. Handbill distribution on private property.
   (a) It shall be unlawful for any individual, handbill distributor and/or handbill sponsor, to distribute or cause to be distributed, deposited, placed, thrown, scattered, or cast any handbill upon any residential property except by handing or transmitting such handbill directly to the owner, occupant, or any other person then present in or upon such private premises or by placing or depositing the same in a manner to secure to prevent such handbill from being blown or drifting about such premises, except that mailboxes may not be used when prohibited by federal postal laws or regulations.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to distribute or cause to be distributed, deposited, placed, thrown, scattered or cast any handbill upon any residential property if requested by anyone thereon not to do so, or if there is a no trespass(ing) sign placed on such premises in a conspicuous place upon or near the main entrance to the residence. A no trespass(ing) sign shall be sufficient if it is weatherproof, not less than three (3) inches by four (4) inches in size, and bears the words "no trespassing" or "no trespass" with letters not less than two-thirds (3) of an inch in height. (Ord. No. 2021-9-23, § II, 9-27-21)
- Sec. 11-143. Failure to comply with no trespass sign. It shall be unlawful for any person to go upon any residential premises uninvited and ring the doorbell, knock upon the door or create any sound for the purpose of attracting the attention of the occupants of the residence if there is a no trespass(ing) sign placed on such premises in a conspicuous place upon or near the main entrance to the residence. A no trespass(ing) sign shall be sufficient if it is weatherproof, not less than three (3) inches by four (4) inches in size, and bears the words "no trespassing" or "no trespass" with letters not less than two-thirds (½) of an inch in height. (Ord. No. 2021-9-23, § II, 9-27-21)
- Sec. 11-144. Penalty.
   Any person violating this division or f

Any person violating this division or failing to observe any provision of this division shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in subsection 1-4 (b) of this Code of Ordinances by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Every day the violation continues shall be deemed as a separate offense. Proof of mental culpability is not required for conviction of an offense under this division.
